# The role of the Governing Body

A governor is someone who:

- is a volunteer
- cares about teaching, learning and children
- represents those people with a key interest in the school, including parents, staff, the local community, the church and the local authority
- is part of a team which accepts responsibility for everything a school does
- has time to commit to meetings and other occasions when needed
- is willing to learn
- is able to act as a critical friend who supports the school but also challenges and asks questions about how the school works and the standards it achieves
- acts as a link between parents, the local community, the local authority, the church and the school.

The full Governing Body meets regularly throughout each academic year. The Headteacher's written report on the school is considered and discussed at each meeting. There are also sub-committee meetings held. These committees deal with specific issues, e.g. finance, staffing, curriculum, premises and health and safety.

#### Work of the Governing Body

The governors are each allocated a curriculum subjects. The governors regularly visit each class to monitor the impact of the spending decisions on the quality of learning experiences at our school. They report back to the other governors during the meetings. Groups of children have presented to members of committees on an arrangement of topics and governors have visited the school to observe activities and talk to pupils. This helps ensure the pupils are making progress across a range of areas.

# **School Clubs**

## **Breakfast Club**

The Welsh Assembly Government funds a proportion of the Breakfast Club initiative where children can have a breakfast of cereal or toast and are supervised until school starts.

Breakfast times are 8.00 am to 8.45 am. The children can choose to play games, draw or listen to music.

The charge is £1.50 a day.

### **Attendance**

The Headteacher and Deputy Headteacher regularly monitor attendance and punctuality and discuss pupils whose attendance causes concern. Parents are asked to phone or message the school on the first day of absence to let us know why your child is absent or late.

The school will contact any parent where an absence is not known.

Attendance last year was **92%.** The governor set target was 95%.

We can only achieve the expected standards if you support us by ensuring your child is in school when they should be.

We focus on attendance because...

- School work is easier to cope with
- Pupils feel more secure
- Friendships more easily maintained
- Longer term prospects are better being on time

We focus on lateness because.... If your child is 10 minutes late a day they miss:

- 50 minutes learning a week
- 633 minutes a term
- Over 32 hours a year



### **Enrichment Opportunities**

- Children in Year 2 -6 have visited Rhayader Swimming Pool for swimming activities during the vear.
- Children in Year 5/6 visited Llangrannog Urdd Activity Centre for 3 days to do 'outdoor and adventurous activities' and learn Welsh.
- Children in Year 4 visited Cardiff Urdd Centre to learn about the capital city and learn about the journey of coal.
- We have sports day for each year group during the summer term.
- We enter football, cross country, cricket and netball tournaments

We are fortunate to have excellent sporting facilities which allows the children to have regular and varied physical activity lessons i.e. a large hall, a large field and wooded area, playground with a climbing wall plus equipment which is put out regularly such as bike and scooters.





The school is cleaned daily once the children have left for the day. The school employs three cleaners across the school daily. In 2023 – 2024, one job was shared by teaching assistants working at the school. The cleaning team are:

Miss Zoe Allen – Cleaner in charge

Miss Emma Jones, Mrs Anneka Price and Miss Shannon Hamer.

As the school has struggled to fill the cleaning hours, following Mrs Price and Miss Hamer's resignation so they could cover After School hours, the governors have appointed an external contractor to cover those hours and ensure all school areas are cleaned daily.

### **Toilets**

The school has five sets of male/female facilities for pupils, with a total of 17 toilets and 4 urinals. There are male and female staff toilets. There are also 2 disabled toilets, one with disabled changing facilities.

### **Transition**

The school's partner high school is Llanidloes High School. Some of the children attend Ysgol Calon Cymru School as a preferred placement.

To help prepare the children for the move to secondary school, we have regular meetings involving staff and children with both these schools.

### <u>Welsh</u>

The school is a dual stream school, speaking both Welsh and English. Three classes are taught through the Welsh medium and the remaining six classes are English. All pupils are taught Welsh and the school has adopted 'Siarter Iaith' to further improve the use of Welsh throughout the school. The school is waiting for the Silver 'Arian' accreditation.

## PTFA

The school is very fortunate to have an active PTFA who organise many fun events for the children whilst also raising money for the school. Events include Film Nights, Disco's and summer and Christmas Fairs.

\*\* Please remember that all parents are automatically members of the PTFA and everyone is very welcome to attend meetings and help at the events.



### **Healthy Eating and Drinking**

The school promotes the importance of a healthy lifestyle amongst the pupils, particularly in relation to healthy eating and drinking. The children bring a healthy snack into school or break times and they are encouraged to drink water throughout the day. The school sells fruit daily for 30p.





## **Charging Policy**

Under the terms of the Education Act the school will seek voluntary contributions from parents for such activities as excursions. These contributions are entirely voluntary and no child will be excluded from any such activity because he/she has not contributed. If contributions are not sufficient to cover the majority of the costs it may be necessary to cancel the proposed activity. The cost of every activity is kept to a minimum and often the school subsidises the event through the PTFA or grant funding.

The school receives regular advice and guidance through the school's finance support officer who helps draw up the school budget with the governors who helps monitor and update the school finances.

The school also has a school fund account, which is a current account with a local bank allowing the school to pay in cash and cheques and have a chequebook and bankcard to pay for non-vat resources and equipment to companies not registered on the Powys e-procurement payment site. This fund is often used as a holding account for donations, which are then paid to the Powys account when equipment is purchased.

## **Equal Opportunities & Disability Equality Plan**

The school does everything possible to ensure that all pupils are offered the same opportunities regardless of race or gender. Discrimination of any kind is not tolerated.

At Rhayader Primary School we are committed to ensuring equality of education and opportunity for disabled pupils, staff and all those receiving services from the school. We aim to develop a culture of inclusion and diversity in which people feel free to disclose their disability and to participate fully in school life. The achievements of disabled pupils and students will be monitored and we will make reasonable adjustments to make sure that the strength, which should be respected and celebrated by all those who learn, teach and visit here.

## Additional Learning Needs (ALN)

Mrs Wendy Thompson (ALNCo) offers support to pupils with their learning and gives advice to staff and parents of children with additional learning needs, throughout the school. Mrs Lisa Lloyd is the governor with responsibility for ALN.

In 2021 – 2022, the school started work on the new ALN legislation, called the <u>Additional Learning</u> <u>Needs (Wales) Act 2018</u>, and <u>Additional Learning Needs (ALN) Code 2021</u>, which will replace all of the existing legislation and guidance about special educational needs.

Over a three year period, the new ALN system will replace the previous Special Educational Needs (SEN) system. As well as the name change, responsibilities towards children and young people with ALN is changing too.

All children with Additional Leaning Needs have an Individual Development Plan (IDP) which replaces the previous SEN Statement, Individual Education Plan or Learning and Skills Plan. Learners with any level of Additional Learning Need who require Additional Learning Provision' (ALP) to be made for them, will be entitled to an IDP outlining their support needs. This new system protects the rights of all children, regardless of the extent of their additional learning needs.

When the school is 'made aware' that a child or young person may have additional learning needs [ALN], it MUST decide whether that child or young person does have additional learning needs through issuing an IDP notice.

Parents can request that a school consider their child's needs and request that a decision regarding ALN and IDPs are made.

Parents will be part of developing the IDP.

## **School Policies**

All school policies have been drawn up and ratified by the Governing Body. These include statutory and non-statutory policies.

### **Complaints procedure**
